Reservation requests received after that date will be honored subject to available places resulting from cancellations and the ability of the food service to make the necessary adjustment. A prepayment refund will be made for cancellations received in the Office of the Department of History on or before April 3 and, after then, when we can substitute a late request.

The Friday banquet will be the best and most expensive meal that the University Center serves, a large steak with all the trimmings. The Saturday luncheon will be provided by a popular caterer. The cost of the two meals, we are pleased to report, is only 25 cents more than that of the dinner alone of the TSHA in Waco.

Although registration for the other events is not necessary, it would be helpful if we could have some indication of approximately how many planned to be present for each event.
