Seventy-Sixth Annual Meeting

The Coronelli globe, which dates from 1688, went on permanent display in the Rotunda of the Southwest Collection/Special Collections in late December.

In 1683, King Louis XIV of France commissioned the globe. Today, it is one of three such 1688 Coronelli globes in the United States. American newspaper magnate William Randolph Hearst purchased it in the 1920s as part of a now unknown European estate.

The globe was purchased from the Hearst estate in the 1950s and eventually came into the ownership of Dallas oilman Robert B. Moody. He sold the globe to Texas Tech in 1968 where it was displayed for many years in the University Library.



Dean of Libraries E. Dale Cluff said the globe was purchased in 1968 for less than \$13,000, but a current appraisal estimates the globe's value at approximately \$300,000. The globe was originally purchased to celebrate acquisition of the library's one-millionth volume.

The globe was refurbished through a \$56,000 donation from Texas Tech Regent James E. Sowell, Class of '70, who dedicated it in honor of Texas First Lady Laura Welch Bush on May 9, 1997 for her support of education, libraries and literacy. The globe is displayed in an optical quality glass enclosure.
