Midland, sometimes called "**The Tall City**," sits in the heart of Texas cattle and oil country. Founded in the late nineteenth century, Midland is home to some 100,000 people. It is served by Interstate Highway 20 and by rail and air lines. Midland College and the University of Texas, Permian Basin provide higher education opportunities for its citizens, and the oil industry employs a major part of Midland's work force.

Once a large number of sheep grazed in the Midland area, but cattle raising and oil exploration have come to dominate this oasis in Southwest Texas. The city contains museums, art galleries, and live theaters. Its symphony is the largest in West Texas. There is much to see and enjoy here. Make yourself at home.
