



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ENCYCLOPEDIA OF BUFFALO HUNTERS & SKINNERS, Volumes 1 and 2

Miles Gilbert, author of a previous book and numerous articles about buffalo hunters, began research on this book in 1994; Leo Remiger, from Anchorage, Alaska, heard about Miles' research, offered his own cache of names and bios, as did Sharon Cunningham in 1996. Since then, this trio has spent many hundreds of hours traveling, calling, e-mailing and searching museums, archives, libraries, books, newspapers and magazine articles to find as many of these buffalo hunters and skinners as possible.

BK2311 ENCYCLOPEDIA OF BUFFALO HUNTERS & SKINNERS -

Wol. 1: A-D by Miles Gilbert, Leo Remiger & Sharon Cunningham

Volume 1 of a proposed multi-volume set of books on the decade of the buffalo hide hunters. Entries include mini-biographies of these men, from Waldo P. Abbott through J.N. DuBois, 335 men (and a few women) who hunted buffalo in the decade and a half, from 1870-1885

Hb, 8 1/2 x 11, 286 pgs. Over 300 entries, 91 photos of both hunters and their rifles and accoutrements, 11 maps, 7 illustrations (including two Sharps Factory Letters, and a two page chart listing artifacts located at Adobe Walls during the University of Texas' excavation of the famous battle site. The printed board cover paintings are of buffalo and hunters by our good friend, Fred Fellows of Sonoita, Arizona. Price \$ 29.95

BK2316 ENCYCLOPEDIA OF BUFFALO HUNTERS & SKINNERS -

Vol. II: E-K by Leo Remiger, Miles Gilbert and Sharon Cunningham

The multi-volume book titled above will eventually have (5) volumes. This one, Vol. II, covers hunters and skinners, that have so far surfaced, with surnames that begin with E-K, beginning with skinner William Earl and runsthrough the Kuykendall brothers, Judge and John, who hunted late [1886-1888]in southeastern New Mexico. This volume will be essentially the same size as Vol. I [A-D] and they will look alike on the bookshelf.

BK2315 THE SKINNING KNIFF written and published in Birmingham, Alabama, by the late M. H. Cole, in 1996. He was the author of four volumes of U. S. Military Knives.

The book is 153 pages of professionally hand lettered, hand drawn sketches of skinning knives from Abercrombie & Fitch to George Wostenholm & Son Ltd. At the end of the book are four pages of hand drawn knife company logos.

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
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
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
