On the Cover. This mural, located in the former Lubbock National Bank building, commemorates the point of contact between Native Americans and the first European explorers who arrived to North America. In this panel, seen from left to right, are figures representing Native Americans of the Plains, Pueblo, Mayan, and Aztec cultures. Millard Sheets, the lead artist, and Susan Lauritari painted the 42' x 11' mural in 1960 with oil paint on canvas mounted on the bank lobby's plaster wall. Largely unknown and forgotten this mural ranks among one of the most significant artistic treasures of Lubbock and West Texas. This detail was chosen for the 2011 WTHA program owing to the many papers submitted this year that focus on the contributions of the Comanche people in shaping the culture and history of West Texas. 



Motley County and Matador Ranch Tour



In December 1882, Matador Land and Cattle Company was formed by Scottish investors who assumed the Texas ranching operations for \$1.25 million. The acquisition included 1.5 million deeded acres and 1 million acres of open range in Motley, Floyd, Dickens, and Cottle counties. In 1951, the company, which then owned about 800,000 acres, was sold to Lazard Freres and Company of London for \$18,960,000. Upon its purchase from the Scots, Lazard Freres sub-divided the land for sale.

On Oct. 3, 1952, Fred C. Koch, co-founder of what has become Koch Industries, Inc., formed Matador Cattle Company. In 1953, a company owned by Koch acquired three parcels of the Texas-based

Matador Ranch, which was joined with other Koch-operated ranches in Montana and Kansas.


Koch bought the Flying V cattle brand and the "50" horse brand, both of which were used by the Scots during their 70-year ownership. He also acquired the ranch headquarters, south of the city of Matador. It is a stone house that lies east of a spring-fed lake, overlooking the corrals and barns. The house is 7,000-square-feet, under roof. The 24-inch-thick exterior walls are built from rock quarried on the ranch. The house was designed with two separate uses: the west end for the ranch manager and the east end for visiting Scottish investors. Today, the ranch manager lives in the west end, and the ranch's business operations are conducted from the east end. The headquarters is located immediately adjacent to Ballard Springs, a Comanche campsite—one of Quanah Parker's favorites. Other Ranches in the area include Camp Resolution, Mott Creek Ranch, Matador Land and Cattle Company, and the Prairie Cattle Company.

The Ranch Tour Thursday afternoon will also include a visit to the Mott Creek Ranch--once part of the Matador, Hotel Matador, Motley County Museum, the Old Jail, Matador Ranch, and the Roaring Springs historic site. Supper will be at the Windmill Café in the community of Roaring Springs. Vans transportation is available; however people are welcome to drive their own vehicles.

Those not wanting to go on the Ranch Tour can meet the group for supper at the Windmill Café in Roaring Springs, Texas on Thursday at about 7 P.M. and will be responsible for their own transportation.

Those wanting to stay the night in Matador and have driven their own vehicle can reserve rooms at the Hotel Matador which is a historic 1915 Matador landmark. The numbers of rooms in this stylish bed and breakfast are limited (nine) however the owners have assured us that association members would not be disappointed. 


