Cover – Moya del Pino's View of Alpine, 1940. The mural, painted as part of the WPA era art project during the depression, is still on display at the old Alpine Post Office building. Featured on the cover is a cropped view of the mural that shows ostensibly two students reading in the foreground and the Sul Ross State University campus in the background.

Back Cover — The bronc and bronco buster illustration was found on an Alpine building during a remodeling project in the downtown area. Rather than paint over it, the figure was saved for all to see. Black Cowboys: Background and Roles in Texas

Alwyn Barr is professor emeritus of history at Texas Tech University and a former chair of the history department. Among his five authored books on Texas history are: *Black Texans: A History of African Americans in Texas, 1528-1995* (2nd ed. 1996) and *African Texans* (2004). He also wrote the Introduction to a collection of essays entitled *Black Cowboys of Texas* (2000), and has published several articles on other aspects of black history in Texas. He is a former president of the Texas State Historical Association and a member of the West Texas Historical Association.
