Dedicated in 2003 the sculpture is based on the legend of how Wichita Falls got its name—i.e. the utterance of a Native American woman testing the depth of the river at the crossing. History teaches us that the name is drawn from the Wichita Tribe that frequented the area. The actual "Falls" of the Big Wichita River was swept away years ago by one of area's legendary floods. Ironically, the sculpture that honors the legend sits just down river of where the real falls was located--a true blend of legend and fact.

His five books include *El Llano Estacado: Exploration and Imagination on the High Plains of Texas* (winner of the WTHA Rupert Richardson Best Book Award), From Coronado to Escalante: The Explorers of the Spanish Southwest, A Private in the *Texas Rangers: A. T. Miller of Company B, Frontier Battalion,* and *Taming the Land: The Lost Postcard Photographs of the Texas High Plains.* A Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of Texas at Austin, Morris also attended the University of Vienna and Moscow State University. He is and a member of the Texas Institute of Letters. Dr. Morris lives in Austin in an old Victorian house.


